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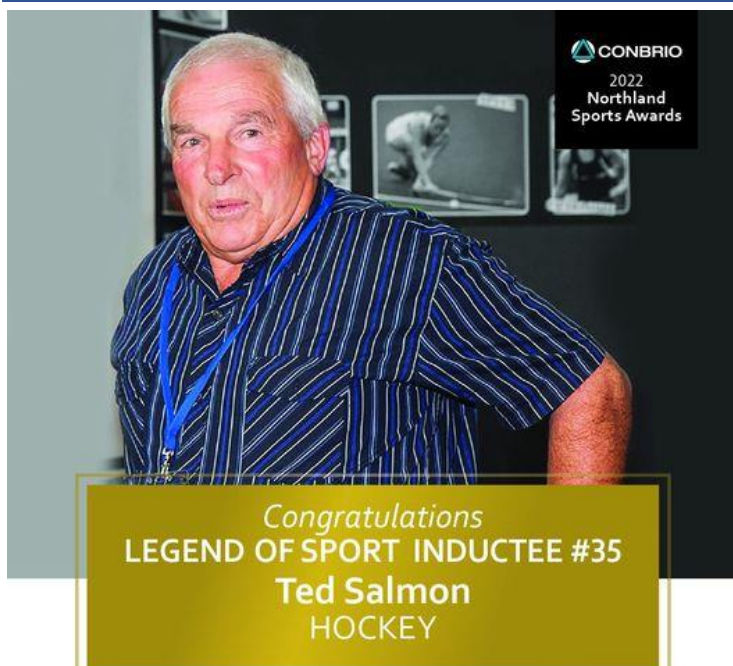

Legend of Sport

Ted Salmon was inducted as the 35th Northland Legend of Sport, with a long-standing involvement in hockey. Ted's passion for hockey started at Kensington Park, Whangārei. He has represented Whangārei in over 100 games and played over 200 games for Northland. He represented New Zealand at the highest level, which included the 1968 Mexico City Olympics and 1972 Olympic Games in Munich. He was 16 when he first played for

Whangarei, 23 when he played for NZ for the first time and was made vice-captain of the national side two years later. He dedicated much of his adult life to hockey – as a Springfield senior men's player for an impressive 27 years. Northland representative player for over 200 games, coach of a wide range of teams, fundraiser and all round go-to guy for everything hockey in Northland.

Kauri Club Athlete Scholarships Awarded

Through the generous support of Alan and Jackie Lints in partnership with the Kauri Club, the Kauri Club has been able to offer these annual scholarships over a 12-month period up to the value of \$2,000. Previously, the Kauri Club made smaller grants of up \$500 twice a year.

The objective is to support talented young sports people in Northland and give them every encouragement to

advance their sporting careers and develop as an athlete and as a person. The Kauri Club was formed in July 2000 by Sport Northland, after a donation to the Trust by the family of the late Garry Frew, the legendary sports editor of the Northern Advocate.



The Garry Frew Memorial Junior Sportsperson of the Year Award went to Hayden Ganley (hockey), who was selected for the New Zealand Junior Black Sticks (U21) team for the Hockey Junior World Cup qualifying games played in Canberra. He was also named in the NZ Hockey U18 Development Squad and represented Hockey Northland at the National Hockey Championship.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

2022 started with New Zealand still operating the Traffic light system to control the Covid 19 pandemic. While the orange setting was in place only during the first few months of the year the impact was again significant on our Association.

Board

The Board continued to provide a balanced approach to the Governance of the Association again in challenging times.

We welcome Lisa Parsonage who is new to the Board for 2023 and also note the return of Toni Hartnell who sought re-election due to a glitch in the rotation system with the Board members.

Richard Storey did not seek re-election at the 2022 SGM, we thank him for his contribution, his input into the Board discussions will be missed.

My thanks go to Shannon and the Board for the guidance and direction in these challenging times.

The later part of 2022 saw the Board review the Strategic Plan and updates should be available soon.

Staff

2022 saw the staff under pressure with Marama Smith not returning at the start of the year. The staff were challenged with the impact of Covid 19 hangover from 2021. Jena Huntington left us in August to spend more time with family, Jena's positive approach and many idea's will be sorely missed.

I wish to personally thank each and every member of the staff for their positive outlook, resilience, and dedication to the hockey community during the year. Often going above and beyond what their roles are.

The staff team in Hockey Northland work incredibly well together to continue to provide high quality hockey opportunities to our membership and Northlanders.

Volunteers

This area provides for the significant framework that supports and allows hockey to be enjoyed by our 2373 members and many supporters. 2022 was a roller coaster in terms of numbers of players where in our Open grades an increase occurred, Collegiate grades showed a small decrease and our Junior grades showed a significant decrease. The continued efforts of the volunteers in Hockey Northland are extremely essential to the health of the Association. Whether they are coaches, managers, club administrators, gear custodians that are ensuring that their club/teams are the best they can be, or it is an individual who volunteers to assist in any area of Hockey Northland your efforts are greatly appreciated, and we cannot thank you enough. We encourage others to commit to these volunteer roles.

To the various committees that oversee many areas of Hockey Northland thanks to those who give up their time freely to ensure that hockey runs smoothly, for those of you looking in from outside we encourage you to put your hand up to assist these committees where possible.

The Northland Umpires Council continued to grow as a group and their ongoing efforts are key to hockey in general. As in 2021 Hockey Northland were actively involved in a cross code side-line behaviour group throughout 2022 and this will continue in 2023, it plays a large part in lowering the side line and on field abuse. To those that umpired or officiated this year whether at National Tournaments or premier, collegiate, junior or social grades thank you so much.

The Club Council Executive started with a full complement of members, and this resulted in many views being put forward in wide ranging and varied discussions. Congratulations to the Māori Council for their commitment to making their competition quality experiences for all participants. Master's were unfortunate to have their National tournament cancelled 11 hours from the start of the competition, very disappointing to those that were actually in Tauranga.

Hockey Northland ran its Open grade Volunteers thank you at the end of the year in 2022, these people are nominated by their clubs for the volunteer work that they do for their club or team.

Competitions

2022 representative tournament programme was almost back to a full season with only Masters not being played.

The U18 Men and Women were able to compete at their respective tournaments with both teams playing some exceptional hockey. Unfortunately, the results didn't quite fall their way.

NHC Men and Women were in a rebuilding phase as they played their respective Tournaments in Dunedin. The Men played some very good hockey and were unlucky to finish 4th in their competition with 2 shootout losses in their semi-final and 3rd place play-off games. The Mark Cromie Motor Group Women were unlucky to lose the shootout in their first game and this came back to haunt them as they missed out on the semi-finals.

Our U14 and U16 tournaments were held in North Harbour and it was great to see so many players, coaches and teams playing for Northland. The most satisfying aspect was our ability to accommodate all players that entered. 2023 will see the U14 age move to U13. From discussions after the 2022 competitions many are looking forward to 2023 reps.

Congratulations to Katie Doar Maddie Doar and Brooke Roberts in representing Northland in New Zealand fixtures. Also of special note Mike

Delaney was assistant coach of the Blacksticks Men.

With the impact of Covid 19 lessened with the removal of the traffic light system our club competitions were able to be completed with a minimum of disruption.

Congratulations to the winners and all those that competed in 2022. Thanks to all the clubs/teams for their input and feedback into the season and efforts during the year.

Collegiate hockey scheduled 2 8-week seasons were completed and so very competitive games were held in all grades. It was great to be able to offer these opportunities to our rangatahi.

Once again thanks to all the team managers, coaches and organisers for your efforts during the year. Thanks to those named umpires that assisted in the collegiate area.

Junior hockey completed a full season for the first time in three years. As mentioned earlier less players chose to play in 2022 than 2021 and this will be a real work on for us in 2023. We did still provide good opportunities for our tamariki to play a full season.

Pay for Play" competitions continued with a huge number of Junior teams enjoying summer hockey. Good numbers again in the Senior summer grades. These Pay for Play competitions are still great opportunities for clubs to use as recruitment options for their winter teams.

Hockey Northland continues to promote the "Balance is Better" (BIB) philosophy which has been created/adopted by Sport New Zealand. With such a disrupted program over the past 2 years it is hard to define the impact that this philosophy has had on our membership.

Events

In the 2022 season Hockey Northland was allocated the North Island mixed collegiate tournament. This was the first Secondary school opportunity for three years and we had great feedback from the competing teams. Hockey Northlands biggest event is our own competitions across Open, Collegiate and

Junior grades and we need to acknowledge those that assisted in making these competitions awesome experiences.

Facilities

The facility remains in top class condition mainly due to the efforts of Lindsay Malcolm as the caretaker. Many people will often mention to me the safe environment that Hockey Northland provides for its community. Once people are in the gate, they know they and their families are in a safe area, but we do need to be vigilant in ensuring our membership stays safe.

2022 saw the removal of vaccine pass requirements removed which freed up staff and volunteers from gate duty.

Brendon Quaid has continued on as the Bar Manager, and I thank him and his staff for their professional approach to the bar operation.

They provide a great family friendly service to our members. Brendon and the staff continue to be diligent in host responsibilities required under our liquor licence.

Koro Don's café again provided outstanding food for the hockey at reasonable prices. This service continues to be an asset to Hockey Northland, and I ask our membership to support Brendon and the ladies in the kitchen during these challenging times

BOARD CHAIR REPORT

I would like to start by thanking Glenn Alderton for supporting our CEO during his limited availability at the beginning of the year. And also thank you Grant to ensure Glenn was aided and resourced during this time. It's important that Hockey Northland continues to be represented at NZ Hockey and Sport Northland forums. to ensure we are consulted and considered when decisions are made that effects our community.

WOW - 2022, our first full winter season post covid with less disruptions than previous years.

At the start of the year, Hockey Northland ran under COVID restrictions and in line with the COVID management Risk Plan. We continued with zoom and videoing conferencing for our first board meeting and Club Council Forum. Unfortunately, NZ master's was cancelled - *again*. Schools still had tight restrictions for outside visitors. Staff had to work rostered shift to minimize covid risk. This started speculations on 'what' and 'how' our 2022 season would look like.

First Board and Club Council Forum for 2022 were via zoom, this also came with some IT issues and capability challengers for many. Fortunately, as the year progressed, club hockey commenced, meetings became face to face and juniors returned to the field, while hockey facilities became the social gathering point for many supporters and members.

Now that we had some kind of normality back in our community, schools were welcoming 'Small Stick program' back in school. This enabled Hockey Northland to continue with 'Grow and Develop hockey strategy within our community.

Next was the focus on Northland representation teams across many National and Regional Tournaments. We were well represented across all competitions with some fantastic individual recognition of players and umpires for their success on the field.

In 2021, we celebrated off field success, many service awards distributed to undeniably

deserving members and volunteers. In 2022, we continued to recognize service and achievement within Hockey.

High recognition of service to sports in northland went to TED SALMON at the 2022 Conbrio Northland Sports Award as #35 Northland Legend of Sport Inductee. He joins a long list of Hockey Legends such as; Trevor Blake # 4 (2004), Ross McPherson #8 (2006), Grant McLeod #16 (2009) and Sandy Hitchcock (nee Bennett) #19 (2010).

Congratulations to Hayden Ganley (GK) 2022 Conbrio Sport Northland Junior Sportsperson of the year.

We had a large contingent of junior sportspersons recognized at High Performance level selected in wider NZ Junior squads and NZ Māori squads. Northland continues to produce high performing individuals.

We also celebrate Vicki Gribbles nomination for 2022 Conbrio Northland Sports Brian Maunsell Memorial Service to Sports Awards and Hockey Northlands 2022 Life Membership. Hockey Northland also inducted four additional Life Members, Margi Kay, John Godfrey, Angeline Waetford and Grant Croft

OPERATIONS MANAGER

Taniwha Programme

The Taniwha programme continued to be provided for players who wanted further improvement in 2022. The guest coach concept that has proven popular with participants was maintained to ensure different training techniques were introduced. This also enabled the Taniwha programme to help develop local coaches.

Term 4 and the end of the winter season gave an opportunity to change the Taniwha programme format. The programme focused on U14, U16 and goalies including U18 goalies. The programme was able to move to Friday evenings and a train then play concept was introduced. This exposed the participants to learning a skill then encouraged them to execute the skill in a game situation. These changes also enabled the programme to take a greater number of participants and reduce the cost considerably.

The play element of the Taniwha programmes also gave the participants the ability to match themselves against players that were advanced, therefore challenging the Taniwha participants in the execution of the newly acquired skills and game play patterns.

Coach Development

Colin Stewart (Bacchus) - Hockey New Zealand Technical Coach and former Assistant/Technical Coach of Blacksticks and Ireland undertook a coach development opportunity for U14, U16, U18, NHC, Prems and Reserves coaches.

The session covered the Taniwha Brand of play, how to coach the technical skills in the Taniwha Brand and incorporate into trainings at all levels, technical aspects of scoring goals and goalkeeping, again incorporating into trainings at all levels and a round table discussions on all topics.

Further sessions are scheduled for 2023.

Balance is Better

Work continued around the application of the Balance is better (BiB) principles. We have made considerable in progress with the youth space in relation to BiB.

- Under 16

At Under 16 level some selection was incorporated into the programme but all players who wished to play were able to participate in the Grant McLeod Northern Associations tournament held at North Harbour.

The Under 16 teams were able to play against North Harbour, Auckland, Counties, Waikato, Thames Valley, Tauranga, and the Bay of Plenty

Northland fielded an 11 a side boy's team and 2, 11 aside girl's teams in addition to 1 boy's and 1 girl's 5 aside teams. Feedback was that overall, the players enjoyed the tournament which was the first to have Northland players since Covid.

- Under13

The Northland under 13 teams travels to North Harbour and were able to play against teams from Auckland, North Harbour and Counties. This festival was run along side the U16 tournament and created a great atmosphere for our players.

The under 13s played a 6-side half field format like that played on Saturday mornings.

In total across the Under 16s and Under 13s Northland had 12 team's participate at the U16 Grant McLeod tournament and North Harbour U13 festival.

Good Sports

Hockey Northland has been activity part of promoting the Good Sports programme which recognises the part that Parents, coaches, teachers, and sport administrator can play in impacting on a child's sport experience. Good Sports aims to "raise adults' awareness about their behaviours in children's sport, and if necessary, promote a positive shift in that behaviour".

Good Sports is well aligned to Balance is Better and is a useful tool to bring the 'Balance is Better' conversation to a local community and parent level.

The Junior club coaches and administrators completed the annual Good Sport training as part of ensuring they can all work towards a climate of development for the Children.

Hockey Northland staff attended a Sport New Zealand delivered Good Sports residential workshops so we can continue to develop Good Sports

Hockey Northland staff have also been involved from the inception of a cross code *Side line behaviour/ Be a Legend campaign* to help reinforce the Good Sport message.

The Sideline Behaviour/Be a Legend campaign started in June and ran for five months (June to October).

FINANCIAL ADVISER'S REPORT

This Financial Report is based on the audited annual Financial Statements.

Statement of Financial Performance

For the year ended 31 December 2022:

Total revenue for the year was slightly down on budget being \$1,078,089 compared to \$1,114,641. This is a slight increase on the previous year of \$1,039,868. Most of the difference is attributable to total activities income being slightly less than anticipated but an improvement on last year.

Expenses for the year totalled \$1,210,604, \$164,751 above the Budget of \$1,045,853. Total expenses included a depreciation allowance of \$200,543 leaving an operational budget variance of (\$35,793). Total net deficit for the year was (\$132,515) compared to a budget surplus of \$68,788 and a deficit of \$78,548 in 2021.

Statement of Financial Position

The Statement of Financial Position continues to show a strong financial position for the organisation. Net Assets as at 31 December 2022 were \$2,977,589 compared with the 2021 year totaling \$3,110,104. Most of the decrease is attributable to the depreciation reduction to fixed assets.

Statement of Cash Flows

There was a slight decrease to the net cash position during the financial year of (\$13,717). Last year there was a cash surplus of \$124,174. The operating cash surplus (before cyclical maintenance and fixed asset investment) covered the yearly budget allocation of cash reserves. The cash reserves are the funds set aside that will be required to cover future maintenance on the associations assets and ensure a cash buffer above those reserves with which to meet its current liabilities. Maintenance & replacement reserves total \$363,719 at the end of the 2022 year.

GROW THE HOCKEY COMMUNITY

PARTICIPATION OFFICER

2022 saw some return to normalcy for the hockey community. The eased covid restrictions allowed a full return to JMC hockey, and the opportunity for a resurgence in In-School delivery. Thus, the need for a Participation Assistant was eminent.

Small Sticks In-School Delivery

After the difficulties and limitations presented by Covid-19, it was vital that we used this year to rebuild relationships and connections with schools. We visited 14 schools over the course of 2022 – returning to 8 schools and 6 new contracts signed. The schools were highly engaged, and the programme was widely received by students and teachers.

Alongside the SSiS programme, we were able to take the 5's boards in to 4 different school visits. The schools took to them with vigour and all schools commented on the versatility and benefits of the equipment after observing the student's engagement with the boards at break times. Thank you to Lindsay Malcom – Northland Hockey Caretaker, for the transportation, and set up of the boards with all visits.

Small Sticks Hockey

We continued with the 2 x 8-week block structure across all Small Sticks winter competition grades – 8 rounds in Term 2, 8 rounds in Term 3. All competitions were able to be played in their entirety and with no interruptions, apart from AIMS Games. Once again, this format proved to a successful approach to allow for flexibility, competition review, and the ability to avoid player overload and boredom.

U14/U16 Northern Region Festivals

Northland was represented by whopping 12 teams to compete in the Under 14/Under 16 Northern Region Festival over the October school holidays. We saw a huge contingent of Northland's up and coming players donning the Cambridge blue for the first time, and for those fortunate to have represented Northland in U13 Collier/Hatch, a return to representative hockey. We sent 2 x girls and 1 x boy's teams to compete in the Under 16 – 11 a-side competition. This tournament ran the duration of 3 days. We also sent 1 x girls and 1 x boys Under 16 teams to compete in the 5 a-side competition. The Under 14 teams competed in a 1-day festival in a 6-a-side competition.

The Northland Under 16 Girls A team just fell short of bringing home the Grant McLeod Trophy, placing 2nd.

The year that was

It was a mixed and disappointing season. The increased interest in Masters hockey was continuing but Covid-19 was still hanging around to the extent that its' after-effects delayed the start of the Masters season until November 2021. At the early stages of the season, the threat of Government mandated lockdowns was always present with its inevitable restrictions on gatherings, separation distances and compulsory mask wearing.

Monday night sessions

The Masters season runs from the end of the winter season, generally around mid-September until late February, with a break over the Christmas period from mid-December to mid-January. However, it does not include a formal structured competition similar to that of the winter season. Rather, turfs are made available on a Monday night for those interested to turn up and join with others in a game. Everyone is welcome - there is no requirement to be a current player, to have played during the winter season, to be a member of a Club, or indeed, to have ever played before. The idea is to encourage persons of Masters age (35 years and above) to continue or return to active sport. And it seems to be working.

The last few years have seen an increase in numbers playing on Monday nights. Currently, the sessions run from 6 – 7pm on two turfs, one for men and one for women. Fees are set separately for the pre-Christmas and post-Christmas slots and are reasonable, just covering the cost of the turfs with no lights.

National Tournament March 2022

National Tournament is the highlight of the Masters season, played at the end of the season in the last week of February/first week of March. Except that this year, it wasn't.

With the outbreak of the Omicron variant, the Government changed its attempts to control the spread of Covid to the Traffic Light settings in mid- late 2021, and introduced mandatory vaccination requirements. In January 2022, Hockey NZ ("HNZ") surveyed the Masters community as to their commitment to the tournament under the circumstances. In early February, New Zealand went into the Red light setting, and HNZ made the difficult decision to pull the pin on the Masters National Tournament for 2022.

Although not unexpected, this was the second year in a row that the tournament had been cancelled and a huge disappointment. We had registered 9 teams for the tournament (Women's 35+, 40+, 45+, 50+, and 60+, and Men's 35+, 40+, 45+ and 50+), but dwindling numbers because of the restrictions had already led to the withdrawal of the W35+ and M45+ teams. The remaining teams were devastated by the cancellation. Some of the teams arranged individual games against nearby Associations. In addition, the Masters Council organised men's and women "Mini Tournaments" at home for our teams, with a BBQ and refreshments to follow. That gave our players, including those eligible from the teams which had withdrawn, at least something akin to a tournament atmosphere and was enjoyed by all.

Masters hockey is still competitive while on the field, even at the older age groups, but definitely more focussed on the social aspects once the games are finished. Tournament is important for both aspects. Many are the friendships made and fostered year after year, not only within Northland but with people from various parts of New Zealand. At 96 teams, it is the largest HNZ tournament in the country, and a fun way to continue to play and associate with hockey in your mature years. I urge you all – players, umpires, administrators – to give it a go. You might enjoy it!

And so to 2022 ...

In conclusion, I give heartfelt thanks to Gail and the staff and officers of Hockey Northland. The support and assistance given to the Council each year, often at short notice and often requiring a

commitment far outweighing that of your regular duties is greatly appreciated. We would not be able to operate without your help.

And finally, a huge thank you to the members of the Masters Council who put their hands up each year to co-ordinate your teams. My job would be impossible without them. Particular thanks also to Sarah Morris and Kim Ackers who respectively took on the roles of Secretary and Treasurer in addition to their team delegate duties.

Do think about joining us – fresh energy and ideas are always needed. At a minimum, we will be looking for representatives on the Committee for each age group next year. Come along, play your part and have your say.

In JMC Hockey 2022 we had 86 teams participating in the winter competition. Team entries were down from 96 teams in 2021, which were 6 below 2020. My hope is, while this is in line with the general lowering of participation in sports in general by young people, that this year we start to see a rise in participation in hockey after a very difficult two years.

2022 saw us having 1 division in Mini sticks development with 12 teams (14 in 2021), and 2 divisions in Mini Sticks with 24 teams total (1 more than 2021). Kiwi Sticks had 23 teams across three divisions (down from 28 in 2 divisions in 2021). Kwik Sticks had 27 teams playing across 4 divisions. 2021 saw Kwik sticks with 31 teams entered. Comparatively, the slight drop in teams is in the older age groups. We look forward to further data on this in 2023 and beyond.

Kwik Sticks have now adjusted and embraced the new format. As a committee we look forward to the future research and results of this change over the next few years as this generation of players continue and develop.

The holiday programme occurred once during 2022, and was well attended with a range of different sports and activities offered.

What happened next defined the 'Northland' brand of hockey that the guys had created throughout the week, staging a comeback for the ages to pull the scores level at 4-4 with 1 minute to play. This meant another shootout, but unfortunately, we fell short again.

While we eventually finished 4th, a huge amount of momentum was built throughout the campaign, and this has provided us with a solid platform from which to progress Northland men's hockey in 2023.

A special mention to Henry Wong for his input throughout the campaign - the week wouldn't have been what it was without him. And also to Sean Henwood for managing the team. Both of these guys bought into what the team was about and what we are trying to build and were a big part of the success.

After a two-year hiatus, the Mark Cromie Motor Group Northland Women were able to compete at the newly reformatted, National Hockey Championship, held in Dunedin.

All, but one player originating from Northland, with the majority still playing in the Northland competition, and the return of 5 region of origin players.

Only two squad members had NHL/NHC experience prior to 2022. The basis of the squad had recently come out of the U18 programme, while many hadn't experienced representative hockey since 2019 - before Covid-19 struck.

The call for players came late in the year which posed a major challenge. We were unable to play any pre-tournament fixtures as a result, and our first NHC match was our first time together as a full squad.

There was a significant lack of involvement from experienced NHL campaigners. This was evident in our initial game speed (easy turnovers early in 1st QTR) and our ability to close out tightly contested games (1 goal loss, Penalty Shoot-Out.) Conversely, the absence of such players presented the opportunity for the next generation of Northland local players to gain valuable NHC experience, earn their first Northland caps, to rebuild and create new legacies within Northland representative hockey.

Two squad members finished within the Top 10 goal scorers of the tournament. Jade Litchfield, 3rd equal – 4 goals, and Jasmyn Maher (GP,) 4th equal – 3 goals.

Subsequent to the 2022 NHC Campaign, Pippa Croft (ROO) was selected for the New Zealand U21 Junior Black Sticks squad.

2022 NORTHLAND AGE GROUP REPS – (UNDER 16, UNDER 14)



The Northern Region Group had a number of discussions around the barriers that prevent youth from participating in hockey and agreed that while in some regions the barriers are different there were a number of common ones.

These being:

- Cost resulting in a competition format that excludes people.
- Length of tournament (Not only for players, but also management).
- Player Workload/Burnout.
- Focus on performance/result driven outcomes as a method of justifying the expense.

It was agreed that the factors why youth love representative tournaments was having time away as a group, team bonding, travel, meeting new people, skill development and that even through this change development could still be achieved.

By moving away from a National Tournament that spans over 6-7 days to a Regional One (Grant McLeod Tournament) played across 4 days this allowed teams to impact on some of the barriers such as reduce the number of expenses, the draw didn't start till lunch on the 1st day meaning teams could travel on that day and save on accommodation.

The change of the format to quarters and shorter tournament reduced the workload on players in this age group. By playing only Saturday through to Tuesday in the 1st week of the school holidays. It gave participants the chance to do other things in the school holidays.

Basis of Preparation

The association has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The association is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

The association is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances.

Tier 2 PBE Accounting Standards Applied

As the association has adopted Tier 3 PBE Accounting Standards no Tier 2 PBE Accounting standards have been applied.

Inventory

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, determined on a first-in-first-out basis.

Income

Income comprises the sums received and receivable by the Association for goods and services supplied to customers, member and sponsors in the ordinary course of the activities of the Association. Sponsors grants are included in income irrespective of the intended application of the funds whether received for operating or capital expenditure.

Investments

Investments are recorded at cost.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at estimated realisable value. Individual amounts that are known to be uncollectable are written off in the period that they are identified.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognised at cost less aggregate depreciation. Depreciation has been calculated using the following rates, which reflect their estimated useful life. Land is not depreciated.

All Weather Surfaces 2% - 12.5% CP & 10% DV

Furniture & Fittings 13% - 20% DV

Land & Buildings 2.5% - 12% CP & 10% DV

Motor Vehicles 30% DV

Office Equipment 9% - 67% DV

Other Turf Assets 8% - 25% DV

Plant & Equipment 10% - 67% DV

Gains and losses on disposal of fixed assets are taken into account when determining the operating result for the year.

Creditors and Accrued Expenses

Creditors are recorded when an invoice has been received. When goods or services have been received by or performed for the association but no invoice has been received, an estimate of the amount to be paid is recognised as an accrued expense.

Donations, fundraising, and other similar revenue

Donations are recognised as revenue upon receipt.

Grant Revenue includes grants given by other charitable organisations, philanthropic organisations and businesses. Grant revenue is recognised when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to income as the conditions are fulfilled

Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit will flow to the Trust and revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those from previous financial statements.
